What is the issue?

- The Uyghur Turkic ethnic minority is being persecuted by the People's Republic of China for decades
- The PRC's suppression of the Uyghurs meets the UN definition of genocide
- The international community has not done enough to put pressure on China for their crimes against humanity

Context

China's current socio-political climate has been highly influenced by the communist party that founded the People's Republic of China in 1949. Preserving the nation-state from internal turmoil and foreign influence became the government's core objective. Repressive policies aimed to broaden majority Han Chinese hegemonic power and stifle any resistance, often targeted Uyghur minorities for their distinct religious and cultural practices rooted in Islam. Within the last few years millions of Uyghurs have been detained for minor infractions, placed in "re-education camps", and endured forced labor.
